A WALK DOWN MEMORY LANE



This Club was formed as a result of a Cutting Horse and Western Performance Day held at "Tamborine House" on 25th July 1971.

"Tamborine House", situated at the junction of Canungra and Beaudesert Roads, was then owned by Sally and the late Bob Wearing.

The "Losers" as they called themselves, recognised the need for the formation of a club to enable people interested in this field of eventing to meet regularly and practice before entering open competition. It would give those without facilities an opportunity to practice and others the chance to learn more about these events that were introduced

into this country with the importation of the Quarter Horse from the United States of America.

Formed 27th November 1971 and amalgamated with the "Sierra Bonita Cutting & Roping Club" on 19th December 1971 Affiliated with N.C.H.A. 19th July 1972.

CELEBRATING LOCAL CUTTING CLUB SUCCESS: DARREN PALMER SHINES AT 2023 NCHA 4CYTE FUTURITY

Greetings, BCWPC Members!

We are delighted to share the remarkable achievements of one of our esteemed club members, Darren, and his family at the highly anticipated 2023 NCHA 4cyte Futurity in Tamworth. Their recent success has not only brought honour and recognition to our local cutting club but also serves as an inspiration to all of us in the pursuit of excellence in the sport of cutting.

Darren, in partnership with his wife Danni's exceptional horse, Doc Smart Tag (Rambo), demonstrated outstanding skill and determination throughout the competition. Together, they achieved the remarkable feat of becoming the Limited Open Futurity Reserve Champions with an impressive score of 219. Their remarkable performance catapulted them into the finals, where they proudly earned the distinction of being a Finalist in the NCHA Open Futurity. We extend our heartfelt congratulations to Darren and Rambo for their extraordinary achievements!

But behind every great rider is an equally talented and accomplished partner. We would also like to acknowledge Danni, Darren's wife, for her unwavering support, guidance, and dedication to the sport. Danni's contributions to Darren's success cannot be understated, and we applaud her for being an integral part of this incredible journey.

Darren, Danni, and their two young daughters, Evie and Sienna, reside on the picturesque Catcus Ranch in Coulson near Boonah. This loving and supportive family environment has undoubtedly played a significant role not only their achievements but that of many others that train here.

It is heartwarming to see the passion for cutting being passed down through many generations.

In light of Darren's remarkable success, we had the privilege of gaining some invaluable insights from him regarding the training and care of cutting horses. We asked Darren several questions to benefit our club members who are aspiring to improve their own skills and knowledge in the sport. Here are some of his valuable responses:

- How long have you been competing and training cutting horses? Darren's journey began in 1996, working with Frank Green. He later had the opportunity to train cutters and show them while working with Tom McTaggart in America from 1997 to 1998.
- 2. Who is or was your mentor in the cutting/ horse world? Frank Green and Tom McTaggart served as Darren's mentors, guiding him along his cutting journey.
- 3. How can I enhance my cutting horse's responsiveness to my cues and commands? Darren emphasizes the importance of having a soft, broke horse that responds well to your hands and feet.

- 4. What are some effective exercises to improve my cutting horse's agility and maneuverability? Flat work exercises are essential, focusing on controlling the four body parts: head, shoulders, ribs, and hindquarters. Walking small circles, flexion, and lateral movements are great exercises to incorporate.
- 5. How can I develop a strong bond and trust with my cutting horse for better performance? Darren recommends rewarding your horse when they respond correctly and avoiding overworking them. Celebrate small victories and avoid pushing for more when unnecessary.
- 6. What are the essential elements of a successful training program for cutting horses? Apart from the right breeding and mindset, Darren emphasizes the importance of starting horses at the right time to avoid rushing their development. Consistency in training is crucial, with a focus on brokenness to your feet and seat.
- 7. What techniques can I employ to refine my cutting horse's stops and turns? Again, Darren stresses the significance of brokenness to your feet and seat in refining stops and turns.
- 8. How do I identify and correct common mistakes during cutting competitions? Watch videos back of yourself, ask questions, ask judges how to gain the most points and never be afraid to ask for help.
- 9. How can I prepare my cutting horse mentally and physically for a show or competition? Fitness is key, keeping them in regular work. A good lope prior to showing so that your horse is calm and settled. Try to feel your horse is listening to you and your cues and in the right mind set. I.e. not looking around, etc.

- 10. What are some key factors to consider when selecting the right cutting horse for my skill level? Be honest with yourself and your own riding ability. A young horse is not going to suit everyone. If you're just starting out in cutting look for an older solid trained cutter to get your confidence on and learn how to show before looking to get into ages event competition horses.
- 11. How can I optimize my cutting horse's nutrition and fitness regimen to enhance performance? High quality feed but monitor how they react to what you feed. You don't want to make them to fizzy. Keep your horses legged up, fit and healthy. Take them for rides out of the arena. Its good for their mind.
- 12. What are the essential maintenance practices for cutting horses? Get a good vet, healthy joints are very important. We use 4cyte. Just like us horses get sore so chiro, massages, etc.

As we celebrate Darren's remarkable achievements and benefit from his invaluable insights, let's remember to support and encourage one another in our own cutting journeys. The passion, dedication, and love for the sport displayed by Darren, Danni, and their family is truly inspiring. Let's continue to learn, grow, and strive for excellence together as a community.

Congratulations once again to Darren, Danni, and their remarkable achievements at the 2023 NCHA 4cyte Futurity! We eagerly anticipate witnessing their continued success in the future.



SETTLING & LOPING



CONDITIONS OF SETTLING HERD

Conditions of settling a herd at the BCWPC event.

- 1. It is up to the competitor who has drawn first position in the head to select a Settler.
- 2. It is up to all competitors of the herd to have a minimum of four helpers available to help the herd settler at the beginning of the event.
- 3. The settler has the right to have more than four helpers assisting to settle the herd if required.
- 4. The first competitor is the only rider to be allowed in the arena while the cattle are being settled.
- 5. There is to be no persons or competitor to be in the arena on foot while the herd is being settled.
- 6. If there is any cattle that need removal from the herd whilst being settled, it must be done by the settler and designated helpers.
- 7. The settler and help should be mounted on horses, which are competent of the task required. The settler and helpers cannot ride a two-year-old or an uneducated horse in the arena.
- 8. The Settler has a requirement to perform to the best of their ability, so therefore they cannot be on a mobile phone, drinking, eating or smoking whilst performing settling duties.

BCWPC LOPING PEN RULES

- 1. Horses not entered into the current cutting classes are prohibited from the enclosed loping pen or area where horses enter into the competition ring. No more than 17 horses can be in the loping pen at any time (this does not apply to help horses).
- 2. No horse can carry two or more persons at any time in the loping pen or competition arena.
- 3. Horses cannot be lead from another horse in the loping area.
- 4. When entering the loping pen yield to all horses in motion.
- 5. Enter the stream of horse traffic from the outside in the same direction as the group and look around before leaving the group to avoid contact with other horses.
- 6. Stay to the inside of the group if you wish to go slow, stay to the outside if you wish to go fast
- 7. Never stop in traffic. Dry work should be done in an area where there is no traffic.
- 8. Riders must be in control of their horses at all times.
- 9. Helmets must be worn by persons 18 years or under.
- 10. All lopers must follow BCWPC attire rules while in the loping pen.
- 11. Do not weave in and out of traffic and avoid contact with other horses. Maintain a constant speed in your position.
- 12. Change direction and maintain the flow in one direction when asked. Always ask when you wish to change direction.
- 13. Apply boots and groom in areas with no traffic.
- 14. Do not tie your horse in loping pen.
- 15. Yield to all vehicles, pedestrians or horses wishing to enter or exit the loping area.
- 16. Maintain BCWPC animal welfare rules while in the loping area.
- 17. Keep a good sense of humour and be courteous to everyone in the loping area.
- 18. Do not ride under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
- 19. Adjust stirrup length to suit the person riding the horse.
- 20. All Horses must be ridden in approved BCWPC equipment while in the loping area.
