HISTORY

This Club was formed as a result of a Cutting Horse and Western Performance Day held at "Tamborine House" on 25th July 1971. "Tamborine House", situated at the junction of Canungra and Beaudesert Roads, was then owned by Sally and the late Bob Wearing.

The "Losers" as they called themselves, recognised the need for the formation of a club to enable people interested in this field of eventing to meet regularly and practice before entering open competition. It would give those without facilities an opportunity to practice and others the chance to learn more about these events that were introduced into this country with the importation of the Quarter Horse from the United States of America.

GENERAL CLUB RULES

RULE 1: MEMBERSHIP & FEES

- A All Members are accepted on the same basis with equal rights: one ruling applies to all.
- B All the club forms are available via the club website. Membership forms to state: "MEMBERS PARTICIPATE IN ALL EVENTS AT THEIR OWN RISK". A parent or Guardian is to sign Youth Membership Forms.
- C The BC&WP Club does not accept affiliation of other clubs, but single membership is welcome.
- D Membership falls due on the day after the Annual General Meeting of the calendar year in which the Annual General Meeting is held. All membership fees must be paid before the Club's first official activity in the same calendar year.
- E Any Member joining after the month of September will automatically remain financial for the following year but, should fees be increased, the Member will be obliged to pay the difference.

F ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTION: \$120.00 per Family -

Two adults residing at the same address and their dependents who are 18 years of age and under. Both adults have equal

voting rights.

The Management Committee reserves the right to increase fees if necessary, to defray costs.

- G Both the Model Rules (Constitution), Know Your Club (Club Rules for Events) and Club Newsletter are available on the BCWPC Website; www.bcwpc.com.au On joining, Members may request a copy of the Model Rules (Constitution) and Know Your Club (Club Rules for Events) if they do not have access to a computer or smart phone.
- H Members shall be obliged to pay full cost for Clinics at the time of booking. If members are unable to attend, they may find a substitute to fill the position. Application may be made in writing along with a medical certificate or vet certificate to the management committee for a refund under extenuating circumstances.

- I Cancellation of Club Day nominations after entry cutoff date will only be accepted in cases of hardship, a medical certificate or vet certificate is required otherwise Members will be obliged to pay full entry charges as per nomination.
- J Instructors will receive a fee as negotiated. Should fees collected be less than the amount due, the Club is to pay the balance due.

RULE 2: YOUTH MEMBERSHIP

- A Youth Membership is offered to all Youth aged 18 years and under. If a Youth turns 19 during a year, he/she shall remain in Youth Classes for the duration of that year.
- B Points gained in Youth events are awarded to the Youth Member, not the Youth's horse/s. Trophies are awarded at the end of the year for all Youth events.
- C Youth may compete on the same horse as that ridden by an adult member of the family.
- D Two (2) Youth members of the same Family may ride the same horse and both score points
- Youth members entering **Youth Cutting** events may compete on a maximum of two (2) horses for the duration of the Club year but may only nominate ONE horse to receive competition points. The horse must be nominated to the Secretary prior to the competition.
- F Youth may not ride or handle stallions at Club Days.
- G All youth riders must have a responsible guardian on the grounds as per AQHA rules.
- H Youth members may only gain points in Youth classes. Youth who compete in Youth classes are not eligible to compete in other classes.
- Youth Members may sit in with a Judge to learn more about judging. One Youth per Judge is permitted. Youth Members are to advise the Secretary prior to a Point Scoring Day being held when wishing to avail themselves of this opportunity.
- J Youth members are welcome to attend all Club meetings but do not have the right to vote on motions.
- K All Youth riders **must wear an approved safety helmet at all times**, whilst riding on the Club grounds whether competing or not. Safety standard numbers for these helmets are AS-NZS 3838, ARBHS 2012 and ASTM F1163.

RULE 3: SUNDRY RULES

- A **Unless otherwise stated,** the starting time for Club Days will be 8.00 am and events will commence with those Members present.
- B Only Financial Members are permitted to be mounted on a horse on the club grounds and be in the arena on Club Days.
- C All complaints regarding incidents occurring on Club Days are to be in writing and lodged with a Committee Member so the incident can be addressed at the next committee meeting.
- D "Snap" decisions to resolve any issues on any day may be made by a majority of five (5) Members of the Management Committee.
- E If a dispute is to be heard on a Club Day where less than five (5) Committee Members are present, then the general members shall elect the number required to bring the Committee Member number on that day to five (5).
- F Any member that abuses a horse on any Club Day will be reprimanded by the Club President. If abuse recurs, the Committee will review the offending Member/s standing.
- G Members bringing dogs to Club Days must keep them under control at all times. They must be either on leads under the control of a responsible adult or tied to the owners' trailer or vehicle.

- A) The BCWPC does not tolerate alcohol and drug intoxicated members. The committee or show management and/or arena director have the right to bar an obviously intoxicated person from the club grounds. The committee has the right to immediately disqualify, refuse entry and remove from the grounds any person who violates this rule. Refusal to comply with the committee's request regarding this rule will result in immediate removal by the police.
 - b) No glass bottles or alcohol of any kind is permitted in either of the working arena areas at any time.
- Arena owners are to be paid a hire fee as determined by the Committee in appreciation of the use of their facilities and to assist with costs of maintenance. Should any arena owner donate money back to the Club it is to be recorded in the Club Minutes and a letter of appreciation is to be sent from the Club.
- J All children on grounds must be supervised by a responsible adult who is not riding.
- K Club Members may place Commercial advertisements in the Club Newsletter. Non-Members may place advertisements. Advertisements carry a charge as determined by the Committee. Costs for any major advertisements shall be negotiated with the Committee.
- L Judges will be selected by the Committee. Judges' decisions will be final, and no correspondence will be entered into. The "nominated" Judge is to be paid fees as negotiated to help defray travelling expenses. The Secretary is to write letters of appreciation to all Judges, except those on the Committee.
- M Members attending Clinics or Training Days may wear caps and short sleeved shirts with collars but no singlets or T shirts. Appropriate safe footwear must be worn.

Although these are the current Club Rulings as set down by resolution, they are subject to change from time to time.

CUTTING RULES

RULE 1: DEFINITION OF CUTTING EVENTS PLEASE READ HOW TO CHOOSE AN EVENT AT THE END OF THIS RULE

A - OPEN HORSE EVENT

One handed event. Any legal headgear.

B - NOVICE HORSE \$3000 (Horse earnings won at any association)

One handed event. Any legal headgear.

C - ROOKIE \$1,000 (Earnings won at any association)

One handed event. Any legal headgear. Rookie riders can also compete in Snaffle Bit Cutting or Beginner Horse Cutting as long as the horse they ride is eligible for the respective event.

D - BEGINNER HORSE

Horses can be ridden one or two handed in any legal headgear which is appropriate for the event in which it is competing. A horse that has been shown in any one-handed Cutting event is ineligible to be shown in the Beginner Horse at the Club.

E - BEGINNER CUTTER/RIDER

(*Please note competitive Snaffle Bit Riders are NOT eligible to compete in this event.)

Open to Riders who have not shown a horse one handed in any one-handed cutting event. Horses can be ridden one or two handed in any legal headgear which is appropriate for the event in which it is competing. Competitors can use western or fender saddles.

F - SNAFFLEBIT

One or two-handed snaffle bit event. No lifetime earnings apply. End of year winners and runners-up are not required to move out of this event.

G - YOUTH EVENTS

Any legal headgear. Judging information: - The Youth cutting event will be judged at the judge's discretion with major penalties penned on the judge's sheet. Credit to be given for effort to be ridden one handed. Credit to be given for ability to control the cow. Credit for eye appeal. Penalty for being out or position on the cow.

NO TRAINING AIDES ARE PERMISSIBLE ON COMPETITION HORSES

Horses must be shown in the required tack for any event in which they are competing. Competitors must wear the required attire for the events in which they are competing.

TO HELP YOU CHOOSE WHAT CUTTING EVENT TO ENTER IN PLEASE READ BELOW

The event entry rules of the "Club" are at present:

COMPETITION RIDER EVENTS:

BEGINNER CUTTER/RIDERS and YOUTH can nominate ONLY in the RESPECTIVE RIDER EVENT they choose. THE RIDER CANNOT COMPETE IN ANY OTHER EVENT.

(EXCEPTION) ROOKIE \$1000 RIDERS can also compete in Snaffle Bit or Beginner Horse providing the horse they ride is eligible for the respective event.

However, the rider can nominate on three different horses but MUST nominate ONE horse before the start of the event on which to receive competition points.

(*Please note competitive Snaffle Bit Riders are NOT eligible to compete in the Beginner Cutter/Rider event)

COMPETITION HORSE EVENTS:

OPEN, NOVICE \$3000, BEGINNER HORSE AND SNAFFLE BIT. A HORSE ENTERED IN ANY ONE OF THESE EVENTS CANNOT ENTER IN ANY OTHER HORSE EVENT.

If you nominate in any competition horse event you can nominate no more than three separate horses, ONCE ONLY, in their eligible event.

<u>PRACTICE DAYS</u> are a good opportunity to work your horse where you have five minutes and the opportunity to ride up to TWO different horses. Each horse can be entered once only.

Some of you might feel these rules are restrictive but the Committee must be mindful of being able to source sufficient numbers of cattle from our suppliers which at times can prove to be difficult. The club programme provides at least SIXTEEN separate days a year incorporating Cutting Competition and Practice events.

RULE 2: CLASSIFICATION OF CUTTING HORSES AND RIDERS

- A Any **Rider** who has shown in any one-handed Cutting event is ineligible to compete in the Beginner Rider/Cutter at the Club
- B A **Horse** that has been shown in any one-handed Cutting event is ineligible to be shown in the Beginner Horse at the Club.
- C The same horse may be ridden in Youth and or Beginner Rider Events and competitors are eligible to score points.
- D High Point Winners and Runners-up in all classes EXCEPT in Beginner Cutter/Rider and Snaffle bit classes will be upgraded each year.
 - Upgrading of Beginner Cutter/Riders is solely at the discretion of the Committee. The Committee has the authority to declare a Horse or Rider is not yet capable of competing at a higher level.
 - Snaffle Bit end of year winners and runners-up are not required to move out of this event.
- E Horses, Beginner Cutter/Rider, Snaffle Bit Horses and Youth (except for Rookie Cutting Riders refer to 1C) **must** compete in their division according to classification and **REMAIN ONLY IN**THAT **DIVISION** throughout the year unless reclassified by the committee.
- F Any Member wishing to re-grade a horse must apply to the Committee in writing for permission.
 - The Committee has the authority at the end of the year to upgrade any horse or rider according to their performance.
- G A new Member who wishes to compete in classes other than OPEN must satisfy the Committee that both he/she and their horse/s are eligible for these classes. New Members should refer to Rule 4 when nominating for events and if they have a query, they should contact a Committee Member for clarification as to which Event/Class they are eligible for. The history of the horse and rider in previous competition will be a deciding factor in the decision.
- H MEMBERS ARE TO RESPECT THE COMMITTEE'S DECISIONS.

RULE 3: LEGAL HEADGEAR

(**NOTE:** Twisted wire bits are not to be used on the club grounds)

A WESTERN BITS

Any bit intended for use complete with a curb strap or chain. Mouthpiece may be bar, port or jointed. Bits include: Grazing Snaffle, Cowboy Snaffle, Jointed Snaffle with shanks, Half-breed, bar or Spade. Curb straps and chains must be of a minimum width of 1.25 cm (1/2 in) and must lie flat to the horse's jaw. These must meet with the approval of the judge.

B WESTERN SNAFFLE BITS:

Plain smooth jointed mouthpiece of 1 cm (5/16 in) minimum diameter 2.5 cm (1 in) in from the rings or, with an overly wide bit, where the mouthpiece rests on the bars of the mouth. Loose "O" rings, Eggbuts, Dees and Sidebars are permitted. Nylon or leather ring straps are permitted but must be at least 1.25 cm (1/2 inch) wide and have no metal apart from the buckles. Reins must be fastened above the ring strap.

The diameter of Snaffle bit rings must be a minimum of 50mm and a maximum of 100mm. The inside circumference of the ring must be free of rein, curb or headstall attachments which would provide leverage.

C BOSALS (HACKAMORES)

A rawhide braided or leather braided or rope bosal, fully rigged with a fiador and mecate or bosal with reins only. Absolutely no metal will be permitted under the jaw or around the nose, regardless of how padded or taped except a wire core inside a properly braided bosal.

RULE 4: GENERAL CUTTING EVENT RULES

- A maximum of two (2) Youth and/or two (2) Beginner Cutter/Riders may compete on the same horse on the same day and both score points in their respective events.
- B The maximum number of horses that can be ridden by any adult competitor on a competition day is three.

(Example) <u>RIDER EVENTS:</u> (Beginner Cutter/Rider and Rookies) The competitor can nominate up to three horses in the competitor's respective eligible event (refer to Rule 3 F) but can only score end of year points on ONE horse which has to be nominated PRIOR to the event on the day. **Note: Youth members refer to Rule 2E.**

(Example) <u>HORSE EVENTS:</u> (Open, Novice, Improver, Beginner Horse and Snaffle Bit). A single competitor can nominate up to three different horses one time only in the <u>horse's</u> respective eligible event.

- C Cattle for Cutting will only be available for those Members who give notice by nominating prior to the closing date as advertised. Late nominations cannot be accepted. Cancellation of nominations will be accepted in cases of hardship only prior to the ordering of cattle, a medical certificate or vet certificate is required otherwise Members will be obliged to pay cattle charges as per nomination.
- D In the case of a Family Membership who own ONE ONLY competition horse, two family members may participate on the same horse in the one event. One will be eligible to score towards a high point award but the other shall participate as a "Restricted Rider" and be obliged to ride at the end of the event and will not be eligible for points or placings. This rule applies only to events in which the HORSE is classified.
- E Should there be only one (1) entry in an event that event will be held
- F The Committee reserves the right to remove any problem horse or rider from an arena and/or grounds if necessary.
- G The Club shall use Australian Quarter Horse Association and National Cutting Horse Association of Australia rules as guidelines for the conduct of events.

- Where AQHA, or NCHA Rules and Beaudesert Cutting and Western Performance Club Inc Rules disagree, then BC&WPC rules will override those of the AQHA or NCHA.
- All cutting nomination fees and charges are to be paid to the Secretary or their Representative or via the club website PRIOR TO THE COMMENCEMENT OF COMPETITION / CLINICS / PRACTICE ON ALL CLUB DAYS.

RULE 5: POINTS SCORING ON OFFICIAL POINTS DAYS

A Four places will be awarded in each event. Points will be allocated according to the number of entries.

- B In the event of equal points (ties), points are divided, for example, if two horses tie for first place, the first and second points are added and divided by two. No second place points will be given and so on. Where horses tie for fourth place, each will share one point.
- C Ribbons or place cards will be issued according to placings. No ribbon or place card will be awarded to any competitor who has scored a zero in an event or "No Score" in Cutting events.
- D Members may inspect Judge's Score Sheets after an event. The Official Points Scorer should be approached with regard to furnishing the same.
- E Members not wishing to record scores in events on Points Scoring Days should inform the Secretary or their Representative who will note this on the Judge's sheet. All such runs will go last, i.e., go to the end of the draw.
- F POINTS CANNOT BE AWARDED TO ANY MEMBER WHO IS NOT FINANCIAL
- G The Point Scorer and a Member with a sound knowledge of Club Rules will cross check the points tally at the end of the Competition Year and before presentation of end of year awards. These persons will be chosen by the Committee.

RULE 6: END OF YEAR AWARDS

- A The yearly number of Point Cutting Scoring Days will be set at eight (8). TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR HIGH POINT AWARDS in any single event, a **competitor** or **horse must have participated in that event** for a minimum of five (5) Points Scoring Days. Should the number of point scoring days be less than eight, the number of days attended for points eligibility will be reduced. The number will be calculated (rounded up if necessary) as half of the number of eligible days plus one.
- B Trophy Buckles will be awarded at the end of each year to the High Point Cutting Horse or Cutting Rider and Trophies awarded to the Runner-up in each of these divisions: -
 - Open, Novice \$3,000, Rookie \$1,000, Beginner Horse, Snaffle Bit, Beginner Cutter/Rider, Youth 14 years and under & Youth 15 years to 18 years.
- C SUSAN WEST MEMORIAL TROPHY, a perpetual trophy, donated by Tony Rae & Jenny Alexander is awarded to the Cutting Horse that gained the most place points on count back from competing in Novice and Open Cutting events. The winner of the Sue West Hi Point Cutter Perpetual Trophy will also receive the club trophy/buckle for High Point Cutter. These trophies are to be decided from the one-handed events only, being the Novice and Open".
- D BOB WICKS MEMORIAL TROPHY, a perpetual trophy, donated by Mike Bauer is awarded to the High Point Beginner Rider / Cutter.

CUTTING RULES

The rules for Cutting classes are based on the rules contained in the NCHA Rule Book. Competitors are encouraged to review the rules contained in this book prior to competing.

Judges are to have a whistle in case the rider needs to be whistled off the cattle during their run and a stopwatch is to be kept in announcers' box in case of timer failure.

Competitors competing in one handed classes will have 2.5 - 3 head of cattle available per run on point score days pending cattle availability.

RULE A: TACK

Standard mounted Western saddle with horn. Saddle without a horn is acceptable in Snaffle bit and Beginner Youth classes. Horses must be ridden with a bridle having a bit in the mouth or with a hackamore. A bridle shall have no nose band or bosal and hackamores shall be of rope or braided rawhide with no metal parts. Braided rawhide balls across the horse's nose are not permissible. Choke ropes, tie downs, wire around the horse's neck, nose, or brow band, tight nose band, quirt, bat or mechanical device giving the rider undue control over a horse will not be permitted in the arena. Wire of any kind and on any part of the curb device is not permissible. Twisted wire bits are not permitted to be used on grounds.

RULE B: ATTIRE

Any person in the arena after the start of an event must wear western attire, including hats. Men must wear long-sleeved shirts with collars and buttons or snaps completely down the shirt front. Women must wear long sleeved shirts with a collar. T-shirts and slip over knits are not permissible.

RULE C: EVENT

In cutting horse competitions, horse and rider have two and a half minutes to demonstrate their ability to cut cattle and prevent them from returning to the herd.

A herd of cattle is held at one end of the arena by two riders who do not allow any cattle to pass them until the contestant has the animal, he has chosen to work cut out from the herd. After this animal has been driven past the riders holding the herd, it will have to be turned back giving the contestant a chance to show his horse's ability to keep it from returning to the herd. The turning back is usually done by two riders selected by the contestants.

Contestants usually separate two or three individual cows before time expires. The clock starts when the horse and rider cross an imaginary line (the timeline) approximately fifteen metres in front of the herd. The horse and rider walk quietly into the herd and the rider begins the process of selecting which cow to cut from the rest of the group. The rider carefully selects a cow and drives it forward from the herd. When the separation has been made, the rider must drop or loosen the reins and allow the horse to work independent of any guidance from the rider.

The horse takes control of the contest and with lightning fast starts and turns prevents the cow from returning to the herd. When the cow turns away or discontinues its effort to return to the herd the rider may lift the reins signalling the horse to quit the cow. The cow is allowed to return to the herd and the process of selecting a new cow begins.

The event is scored in a range of 60 to 80 points. Every horse enters the herd with seventy points and the judge adds or takes away from this score to determine the final score for the run.

Below are Credits and Penalties, extracted from the NCHA Rule Book, for use as a guide:

Credits

- a. Each horse is required to quietly enter the herd sufficiently deep enough with very little disturbance, to show its ability to make a cut.
- b. When an animal is cut from the herd, it is more desirable that it be taken toward the centre of the arena, and credit will be given for same. Additional credit will be given the horse which drives the stock sufficient distance from the herd to assure that the herd will not be disturbed by the work, thereby showing its ability to drive a cow.

- c. Riding with a loose rein through a performance is a requirement and will be recognised.
- d. Credit will be given for setting up a cow and holding it in a working position as near the centre of the arena as possible.

Penalties

- a. If the cutting horse or his/her rider creates disturbance at any time throughout the working period (2.5 minutes) they will be penalized.
- A horse will be penalized each time the back fence actually stops or turns the animal being worked.
- c. If a horse turns the wrong way with tail toward animal being worked, an automatic score of 60 points will be given.
- d. While working, a horse will be penalized each time the reins are used to control or direct (to rein) the horse, regardless of whether the reins are held high or low.
- e. If a horse lets an animal that he is working get back in the herd, he will be penalized.
- f. If a rider changes cattle after visibly committing to a specific cow, a penalty will be assessed.
- g. When a horse goes past an animal to the degree that he loses his working advantage, he will be penalised each time he does so.
- h. Unnecessary roughness, such as a horse actually pawing, biting or kicking cattle, will be penalised.
- i. A contestant may quit an animal when it is obviously stopped, obviously turned away or is obviously behind the turn back horses and the turn back horses are behind the timeline. A penalty must be charged if the animal is quit under any other circumstances.
- j. If a horse quits a cow, a penalty will be assessed.
- k. If a horse clears the herd with 2 or more cattle and fails to separate a single animal before quitting, a penalty will be charged. There is no penalty if time expires.
- I. If a contestant is thrown from a horse or horse falls to ground, an automatic score of 60 points will be given.
- m. Any rider who allows his/her horse to quite working or leave the working area before his/her allotted time is up will be disqualified to that go -round with no score.

Note: DO NOT dismount your horse after completing your run until you are over the timeline.

RANCH RULES

Rule 1: GENERAL RANCH POINTS DAY RULES

- Ranch Rules for Points Days are based on the RHAA Rules unless these rules are overridden by BCWPC Rules.
- No horse under 3 years of age may be exhibited.
- No hoof polish/black.
 - No braided or banded manes/tails or tail extensions.
- Trimming inside ears is discouraged. Trimming bridle path is allowed, also trimming of fetlocks or excessive (long) facial hair.
- Equipment with silver should not count over a good working outfit. Silver on bridles and saddles is discouraged.
- Holding the saddle horn with either hand will not be penalised in any class.
- Posting or standing in stirrups at extended trot is acceptable.
- No drag is allowed in Green Horse, Green Rider, Intermediate Horse/Rider, Heritage Snaffle Bit or Youth classes.
- A 'professional' rider has, in the previous three (3) years from the date of competing, received remuneration or compensation for showing or training horses or instructing people in riding or exhibiting.
- A non-professional rider has not, in the previous three (3) years from the date of competing, received remuneration or compensation for showing or training any horse or instructing people in riding or exhibiting.
- Ribbons will be awarded to fourth place in each class
 Points will be allocated according to the number of entries.

- In the event of equal points (ties), points are divided, for example, if two horses tie for first place, the first and second points are added and divided by two. No second place points will be given and so on. Where horses tie for fourth place, each will share one point.
- Horse and Rider combinations that compete in more than one Division at a Points Day will
 only receive End of Year points for the highest division in which they have competed. For
 example, if a horse and rider combination has competed in both Intermediate Horse/Rider and
 Open, then this horse and rider combination will only receive End of Year points for the Open
 division.
- Competitors may inspect Judge's Score Sheets after an event by contacting the Official Points Scorer.
- POINTS CANNOT BE AWARDED TO ANY MEMBER WHO IS NOT FINANCIAL

Rule 2: EQUIPMENT

- Hackamore is the use of a flexible, braided rawhide or leather, or rope bosal, the core of which can be either rawhide or flexible cable. A Hackamore must use a complete Mecate rein which must include a tie-rein. Absolutely no rigid material is permitted under the jaws, regardless of how padded or covered. Horsehair bosals are prohibited. This rule does not refer to a so-called mechanical Hackamore.
- Two Rein. This bit and bosal combination is the transition between the hackamore and bridle and can be used on any aged horse. Only one hand may be used on the reins and hands must not be changed. Any number of fingers between reins will be permitted. Both mecate and bridle reins are to be held in the rein hand. When using two rein equipment, bosals may be of any size,

constructed of braided rawhide or leather and have a nonmetal flexible core. No iron or foreign substance may be used.

- Snaffle Bit Conventional O-ring, Egg-butt, or D- ring. The diameter of Snaffle bit rings must be a minimum of 50mm and a maximum of 100mm. The bars must be a minimum of 5/16" (8 mm) in diameter, measured one inch (25 mm) in from the cheek with a gradual decrease to the center of the snaffle. The inside circumference of the ring must be free of rein, curb or headstall attachments which would provide leverage. Entries ridden in a Snaffle bit must be shown with both hands on both reins. Reins must be bridged with the tails of the reins on the opposite side of the neck. The rider's hands will be carried near the pommel and no further than approximately 50 cm apart. Rider's hands must be steady with limited movement. Failure to comply with this rule will result in disqualification.
- Curb Bits A bit that has a solid or broken mouthpiece, has shanks and acts with leverage. All Curb bits must be free of mechanical devices and will be considered a legal standard western bit. Curb bits must have a shank with a maximum length of 216mm and may be fixed or loose. Ports must be no higher than 90mm maximum, with rollers and covers acceptable. Broken mouthpieces, half- breeds and spades are acceptable. When using a curb bit, a curb strap or curb chain is required, but must meet the approval of the judge, be at least 12.5mm in width and lie flat against the jaw of the horse. A broken strap or chain is not necessarily cause for disqualification.
- Mouthpieces Bars must be round, oval or egg shaped, smooth and unwrapped metal of 8mm to 20mm in diameter, measured 25mm from the cheek. They may be inlaid but must be smooth or latex wrapped. Nothing can protrude below the mouthpiece (bar), such as extensions or prongs on solid mouthpieces than by no more than 1.6mm. The mouthpiece may be two (2) or three (3) pieces. A three-piece will have a connecting ring of 32mm or less in diameter; or a connecting flat bar of 10mm to 20mm measured top to bottom with a maximum length of 50mm, which lies flat in the horse's mouth; or a connecting roller 10mm to 20mm diameter.
- Except for Hackamore/Snaffle bit classes or junior horses shown with a Hackamore, only one
 hand must be used on the reins and the hand must not be changed and the index finger only
 must be between the split reins. Exception: To work a trail obstacle a rider may change hands on
 the reins, but the index figure only must be between the reins.
- Romal is an extension of braided material attached to closed reins. This extension will be carried in the free hand with 40cm spacing between the reining hand and the free hand holding the Romal. The rider's hand will be around the reins with the wrists kept straight and relaxed, the thumb on top and the fingers closed lightly around the reins. Fingers between the reins are not allowed. Use of the free hand while holding the Romal to alter the tension or length of the reins from the bridle to the rein hand is considered to be the use of two hands (except horses shown in a Snaffle bit/Hackamore or where division specific gear rules apply), except during the hesitation or settling of the horse. The Romal will not be used forward of the cinch or to signal or cue the horse in any way. Any infraction of this rule will be penalised severely by the Judge.
- Slip or gag bits and donut and flat polo mouthpieces are not acceptable.
- Horses must be ridden with a bridle having a bit in the mouth or with a hackamore.

OPTIONAL EQUIPMENT FOR POINTS DAYS

- Rope or riata. If used, the rope or riata must be coiled and attached to the saddle.
- Hobbles attached to saddle.
- Tendon Boots, splint boots, bell boots, leg wraps and bandages are allowed in all classes except for Ranch Conformation.
- Glued on shoes and hoof boots are acceptable in all classes.
- Snaffle bit leather chin strap.
- Get down rope

PROHIBITED EQUIPMENT FOR POINTS DAYS

- Martingales
- Draw reins
- Nosebands and tie-downs
- Chain, wire, or metal tie-down or bonnets are prohibited, regardless of how padded or wrapped
- Training tack collars
- Jerk lines for roping
- A bridle shall have no nose band or bosal
- Hackamores shall be of rope or braided rawhide with no metal parts.
- Braided rawhide balls across the horse's nose are not permissible.
- Choke ropes
- · Wire around the horse's neck, nose, or brow band
- Tight nosebands
- Mechanical devices giving the rider undue control over a horse
- Wire of any kind and on any part of the curb device is not permissible.
- Twisted wire bits are not permitted to be used on BCWPC grounds
- English spurs
- · Twisted mouthpieces
- · Whips, quirts, bats

Rule 3: ATTIRE

ATTIRE FOR POINTS DAYS

- Long sleeve shirt, collar (band, stand-up, tuxedo, etc.)
- Western hat (the hat must be on the rider's head when the exhibitor enters the arena) or ASS approved safety helmet. Safety standard numbers for these helmets are AS-NZS 3838, ARBHS 2012 and ASTM F1163.
- Western pants/jeans
- Western boots.

OPTIONAL ATTIRE FOR POINTS DAYS

• Spurs, chinks, and chaps in ridden classes

Rule 4: POINTS DAY DIVISIONS

ADULT:

GREEN RIDER

- Definition: This is a class for inexperienced riders, OPEN riders are NOT eligible for this class.
- Riders will be required to show their horses at the walk & trot only.
- The purpose of this class is to encourage those new to riding and/or new to showing in Ranch
 events
- Those entered in this class are Ineligible for INTERMEDIATE or OPEN classes.
- Any age horse may be ridden two handed in a snaffle bit or hackamore.
- Any safe saddle, with the exclusion of bareback pads can be used. These include English,
 Western, stock, fender and half-breed saddles.
- No Ranch Cattle events or Ranch Reining available for Green Riders.

GREEN HORSE

- Definition: Open to all riders professional and non-professional wanting to bring inexperienced or young horses (3 Yr and over) into the show arena. This class is aimed at giving green horses of all ages an opportunity to attain show experience.
- Horses will be required to show at the walk, trot & lope.
- Any age horse may be ridden two handed in a snaffle bit or hackamore.

- Any safe saddle with the exclusion of bareback pads may be used. These include English, Western, stock, fender or half breed saddles.
- Cattle evens must be ridden in Western, stock, fender, or half breed saddles ONLY.

INTERMEDIATE HORSE/RIDER

- Definition: This division is for non-professional riders and horses with some previous show experience.
- Professional riders are not eligible for this class.
- Riders will be required to show horses at the walk, trot and lope.
- Any age horse can be ridden one or two handed in a snaffle, hackamore, or a curb bit.
- Riders must not swap from one to two hands or vice versa during a class if riding in a curb bit.
- Any safe saddle with the exclusion of bareback pads can be used. These include English,
 Western, stock, fender or half breed saddles.
- Cattle events must be ridden in western, stock fender, or half breed saddles ONLY.

HERITAGE SNAFFLE BIT

- Definition: The purpose of this class is to encourage experienced riders from other disciplines to compete without having to purchase western tack.
- Horses must be ridden two handed in a snaffle bit regardless of horse's age.
- Horses must be ridden in fender, stock, or half-breed saddles ONLY.
- Riders are ineligible to compete in Open Divisions.

OPEN

- Definition: This division is for horses and riders with extensive show experience
- Professional and non-professional riders are eligible for this division
- Junior horses 3 to 5 years of age can be ridden in a snaffle bit, hackamore, or one handed in a curb.
- Senior horses 6 years of age and over MUST be ridden one handed in a bridle, split reins, romal
 or two rein.
- Horses must be ridden in Western saddles only.

YOUTH:

LEADLINE

- Definition: This Division is for riders from 2 to 12 years of age who are not confident to ride unassisted.
- Riders will be required to show their horses at the walk and trot only.
- Horses must be led by a competent person over 16 years of age.
- No rider entering this division can enter any other Division

GREEN YOUTH

- Definition: This division is for inexperienced Youth riders.
- Riders will be required to show their horses at the walk and trot only.
- Riders in this Division are ineligible for Intermediate or Open Classes.
- Any horse may be ridden two handed in a snaffle bit or hackamore.
- Any safe saddle with the exception of bareback pads can be used. These include English, Western, stock, fender or half breed saddles.
- No Ranch Cattle events or Ranch Reining available to Green Youth.

INTERMEDIATE YOUTH

- Definition: This division is for youth with some show experience.
- Riders will be required to show horses at the walk, trot and lope.
- Any age horse can be ridden two handed in a snaffle, or hackamore, or one or two handed in a curb bit.
- Riders must not swap from one to two hands or vice versa during a class if riding in a curb bit.

- Any safe saddle with the exception of bareback pads can be used. These include English, Western, stock, fender or half breed saddles.
- · Cattle events must be ridden in Western, stock, fender, or half breed saddles ONLY.

OPEN YOUTH

- Definition: This division is for youth with extensive show experience.
- Riders will be required to show horses at the walk, trot and lope.
- Junior horses 3 to 5 years of age can be ridden in a snaffle bit, hackamore, or one handed in a curb.
- Senior horses 6 years of age and over MUST be ridden one handed in a bridle, split reins, romal or two rein.
- Horses must be ridden in Western saddles only.

Rule 5: POINTS DAY CLASSES

This is a list of current RHAA show classes. A selection from this list will be offered at Points Days

- Ranch Riding Ranch on the Rail
- Ranch Pleasure
- Ranch Trail
- Ranch Reining
- Ranch Cow Work
- Ranch Cow Work Limited
- Ranch Cutting
- Ranch Boxing
- Ranch Conformation
- No Ranch Cattle events or Ranch Reining available for Green Rider or Green Youth.

Rule 6: END OF YEAR AWARDS

CORRIE KOOT HIGH POINT RANCH HORSE AND RIDER COMBINATION PERPETUAL TROPHY

This perpetual trophy is awarded to the HORSE and RIDER combination that earns the most points at Ranch Points Days during the club year. Any horse and rider combination that competes in Ranch is eligible to win this trophy. Minimum attendance rules apply.

CORRIE KOOT HIGH POINT RANCH HORSE AND RIDER COMBINATION BUCKLE

This buckle is awarded to the HORSE and RIDER combination that earns the most points at Ranch Points Days during the club year. Any horse and rider combination that competes in Ranch is eligible to win this buckle. Minimum attendance rules apply.

- A High Point trophy will be awarded to the Leadline competitor with the highest points score at the end of the competition year.
- A Runner Up High Point trophy will be awarded to the Leadline competitor with the second highest points score at the end of the competition year.
- A High Point Youth buckle will be awarded to the Youth from any of the three Youth Divisions with the highest points score overall at the end of the competition year.
- A Runner Up High Point Youth trophy will be awarded to the Youth from any of the three Youth Divisions with the second highest points score overall at the end of the competition year.

- High Point buckles will be awarded for the highest points score gained in each adult division at the end of the competition year.
- Runner Up High Point trophies will be awarded for the second highest points score gained in each adult division at the end of the competition year.
- The Official Point Scorer and a Club Member with a sound knowledge of Club Rules will cross check the points tally at the end of the Competition Year and before presentation of end of year awards. These people will be chosen by the Committee.
- High Point and High Point Runner Up in each Division will move up into the next appropriate
 Division the following year with exception of Heritage Snaffle Bit and Open. If a rider disagrees
 with this reclassification, they must submit a letter to the Committee requesting to stay in their
 previous division for a further year. This request must be submitted prior to the First Ranch
 Points Day for the following year.

Although these are the current Club Rulings as set down by resolution, they are subject to change from time to time.

CODE OF CONDUCT

The Beaudesert Cutting & Western Performance Club are a not-for-profit organisation that is dedicated to providing a safe and enjoyable environment for its members to partake in friendly competition and social interaction.

- 8. Participate for your own enjoyment and benefit, remembering there are other members including junior members looking for encouragement and inclusion in our sport; and

 - It is an important fact that our youth are the up-and-coming members of our club and are the future of our sport. It is important that all youth club members are encouraged in a constructive and responsible manner.
- 10. Remember that youth participate in sport for their enjoyment.
- 11. Encourage our youth to participate and focus on their efforts and performance rather than their winning or losing.
- 12. Encourage the youth to always ride according to the rules and settle disagreements without resorting to hostility or violence.
- 13. Remember that children learn by best example. Appreciate good performances by all participants.
- 14. Respect the rights, dignity and worth of every youth regardless of their gender, ability, cultural background or religion.

Penalties for a breach of the Code of Conduct to be read in conjunction with the Constitution of the Club.

- a) 1st reported offence written warning
- b) 2nd reported offence written warning
- c) 3rd reported offence Minimum 2 years expulsion and cancellation of membership with the member being bought before the committee and asked to provide reasons for the behaviour and to show cause as to why they should not be excluded from the Club, (the member must re-apply for new membership and be accepted into the Club by the Committee).
- 15. There is a zero tolerance of any physical abuse of any member, committee member or spectator. Any member who is found to have breached this code of conduct will have their membership revoked.
